TECHNICAL CORNER

It is a funny thing when you arrive you never know what is happening. At the Europeans we did a lot of fundamental measurements, especially for olympic material, but no championship measurement.

At the Youth Europeans we had a surprisingly good championship measurement.

At the Games we started measurement without having prepared all needed installations, additionally we needed more time to sticker flags and national codes at the sails and hulls than needed for controls for the equipments. But had enough menpower and time to do a good

At the Games the problem is that you are a small part of a big organisation going its way, which cannot be moved, but for very few boats there is a lot of time so it's no problem to be well finished before the races will begin.

The material was more or less in the rules, small errors as always.

We have learned that there are still a lot of elder marstroom masts with a triangular sailtrack not described in our rules. They had to be modified for this regatta. In Portugal we will discuss how to integrate them in the rules.

I was not astonished but I still wonder about the huge differences in preparing for the main event in the world of sailing: some are perfect, some are well prepared, some you cannot see that they had prepared, at least it was sometimes difficult to see what competitors know or do not know about their equipment. I could observe the first races, then I had to leave. I saw there were no big differences in speed, at least when a juryboat was nearby. But I saw big differences in tactical and strategic behaviour, too many just trusted in happy windshifts or tried to go through by force and so they were punished. Niki Nocke

She had a hard fight with Margriet Matthijsse, NED, who was first in the three last races taking the silver medal. She was also Silver medalist in Savannah in 1996. The bronze medal winner was Serena Amato, ARG.

The International Europe Class Union CONGRATULATES the medallists and hopes that you all will go on sailing the Europe for many years, at least to the next games in Athens 2004.

All the other 24 ladies sailed very well, but you did not have the luck on your side this time. The Europe dinghy was chosen as the singlehanded boat in Athens 2004. Keep on sailing, perhaps one of you can win a medal in Athens.

Shirley Robertson was elected ISAF Sperry World Sailor of the Year. We congratulate.

SELF COACHING

Although most sailors have access to some sort of coaching or training, how much time is spent with the coach? not very much! So to maximise your time with your coach you should do some work before hand which will mean that the time at training weekends, etc, is used to the maximum. Now that we are at the end of the season and looking forward to training over the winter, it is a perfect time to asses your sailing. This will give you an idea of where you are at this moment in time and give you an idea of the areas you need to work on to improve your sailing in the next few months. All of the top sailors use this process, normally every three to four months, to make sure that they are working on all their weak areas. The basic way to do this is to make a list of the main areas of sailing, e.g. boat preparation, boat handling, boat speed, fitness, etc. These areas can then be broken down into smaller areas, such as technical knowledge, tacking, downwind speed in waves, etc. When you have done this you should have

a list of about 40 or so different areas. You then score yourself out of 10 in each area. However before then you have to decide on the scale, what is a 10? is it the best in the world or best in your club or local area? and what is a 0, is it not being able to do the thing at all or is it the worst that you have been? Once you have done this, write a small note at the bottom of the page to remind you. Now you can score yourself in each of the areas.

If you are lucky enough to have someone that you sail a lot with, you can get them to score you in all of the areas as well, you can score their's at the same time. This will give you an idea of how other people rate your sailing and you can discuss any differences you get between the two scores. Now look at the scores and highlight a few areas that you need to do work on, about 7 or 8 different areas is best. You can then think about these areas in detail and try and identify a specific action or manoever that needs to be improved, if you have enough time you can think about all of the areas

and get a long list of things that you need to work on at training sessions. The next step is to think of ways to improve these areas and to set some "SMART" (Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Realistic and Time based) goals to give you a target to achieve by a certain point. Your coach or a good sailor in your club should be able to help you with this. A more detailed introduction to goal setting can be found in most mental training books, there are some sailing specifics ones in the Fernhurst range.

With this plan you now have a list of things that you can work on every time you go out sailing, this will make your training more effective and let you improve faster, you can also let your coach know the areas you would like to work on in the training sessions and you should get more out of the training sessions with your coach. Happy sailing!

St Francis Fall Dinghy and Olympic Classes, San Francisco, California.

Saturday October 27th saw stormy weather with winds from the very irregular southerly direction, making the conditions challenging with off-side waves and extreme puffs rangeing from 15 to 30 knots, with the average wind speed of approximately 20 knots. The gnarly conditionsm combined with a shortage of support boats, resulted in a delayed start. EUROPE INLAND CHAMPIONSHIPS
