TECHNICAL CORNER

I am happy to announce that since the beginning of April 2001 we have one more licensed mast builder. It is Deltasale from the Netherlands. The company was former known for their Optimax products, which had been good quality dinghy spars. After the prototype mast from from Deltasale passed successfully the prototype measurement, the company was issued with an Authorised Manufacturers Code. Together with this company we now have four Licensed Builders for our new one-design Europe mast. These are:

Sail Center of Sweden (SWE) Schutte Unifibre Spars (NED) Tropical Engineering (GBR) Deltasale (NED)

For decision at the upcoming AGM in Vilamoura we have some proposals for class rule changes to become effective in the next year. 1. Procedure for elder masts, of which the model mast was derived from

None.

New rule:

Add at the end of rule 3.5.4 (ix): "Elder SCS/ Marstroem masts till production no. 2292 and built before 01.03.2000 need not to be marked retrospectively with an Authorised Manufacturer Code (AMC) and an Authorised Manufacturer Sticker (AMS). They need either a confirmation on the existing old Measurement Form, that they satisfy the Class Rules with respect to items 3.5.3 through to 3.5.4 (vii) and 3.5.5 or shall be remeasured and issued with a new filled out Measurement Form, both signed by an official measurer."



Reason:

Clarification, how to handle existing SCS/ Marstroem and how measurement forms should look like.

2. Triangular sailtrack at some elder SCS / Marstroem masts

Existing rule:

None.

New rule:

Add at the end of rule 3.5.6. Grandfathering "The triangular sailtrack at elder SCS / Marstroem masts will be grandfathered at all events."

Reason:

It was in the intention of the new mast rules, that old Marstroem masts should stay valid. There were found a remarkable number of masts with a sailtrack shape deviating from the circular geometry described in the mast design specifications. It is not to see that this shape of sailtrack has an influence on speed or handling. Therefore these masts are not in contradiction to the principle of the one design mast.

3. Grandfathering at all other events

Existing rule

3.5.6 Grandfathering

Masts shall comply with these rules after... -at all other events 1 March 2006

Event Authorities may give further allowance.

New rule:

Delete last sentence and enter: "At National events, National Championships and Open National Championships any existing mast once having been legal may be used, but Event Authorities may enter restrictions."

Reason:

The intention is, that all existing and once legal materials shall be continuously allowed to be used on national and low level basis. Many youth sailors start sailing in the Class with old material. Many free time sailors are competing on regional and national basis and have one complete set of material for years and years. It is completely against the interest of those sailors to invalidate any of their material. On that level of racing it won't do anybody harm to allow different mast shapes. Besides it helps to maintain the second hand market for this material.

weights at the mast

Existing rule:

Mast and boom Measurement Notes 3. No fittings should be positioned so that measurement at the stations shown in the measurement form may be obstructed.

New rule:

Add before the last sentence of rule 3.5.5 Weight. "They shall be positioned so that measurement at the stations shown in the measurement form may not be obstructed".

Reason:

To make more evident that even corrector weights may not obstruct the measurement stations at the mast.

5. Sailtrack width

Existing rule:

- 1) Mast Design Specifications Table of Offsets, figure 1: min 3.5 mm
- 2) Mast Measurement Diagram Sheet 1 of 2 3) Mast Measurement Form Item No. 4b10 (a) Sailtrack opening slot, width min 3.5 max 4.5 mm

New rule:

1) Delete Mast Design Specifications - Table of Offsets, figure "I: min 3.5 mm" and enter instead "I: \pm 0.5, 4.0 mm

Reason:

To eliminate the difference between the Class Rules and the Measurement Form.

6. Rudder Fittings

Existing rule:

The fittings to connect the rudder stock to the hull shall be made so that every rudder stock fits every hull. This shall apply for new rudder stocks and boats first measured after 1 March 1998 and all rudder stocks and all boats after 1 March 2000.

New rule:

Delete "and all rudder stocks and all boats after 1 March 2000".

The intention of the rule is to provide reliable measures for the producers of rudder stocks and hulls to avoid the necessity of customising the rudder fittings at either the hull or at the rudder stock. The customers

4. Mounting positions for corrector can easily exchange the rudder system. E.g. a coach can take one spare rudder on the water, which would fit for any of his sailors - this is helpful at big regattas, where coaching does exist. On the other side there is existing a group of sailors (see item 3), who are using old material. Often material in use can be found, where the rudder fittings at both, rudder stock and hull, still have different measures, but fit perfect to each other. As the measure has nothing to do with performance it does not make any sense, that at those old material the fittings have to be changed retrospectively.

CELEBRATING 25 YEARS OF IECA

internationally in 1963, it was not until 1976, that the first boat was seen in the UK.

It was John Harrison and family that saw a demonstration of a Europe at the 1975 Optimist Worlds in Denmark, and together with Peter Taylor, a Finn builder who was looking to extend his range of boats, started the interest of bringing Europes to the UK.

The Harrison's bought two old boats which arrived in the UK in 1976, and meet the IECU President in November of that year to agree the formation of a UK Class Association. Peter Taylor was also granted a licence to build new boats in the UK.

The first Class AGM was held on the 5 March 1977 at Frensham Pond SC, at which stage John Harrison became the first Class Secretary & Treasurer. The inaugural Nationals took place that year with a total of 6 boats - 3 of them sailed by the Harrisson family. In 1979 Rondar's obtained a builders licence, and this led to increased production of UK boats, so by 1980 there were over 100 boats already registered.

Unfortunately other than the measurement certificates we do not have any further records of what happened to the Class until 1986. By then further UK builders had expended to include, Beasley, Dorado, Claridge, Falat, Reg White, Gerry Ledger & Don O'Donnell.

The UK Class at this time was dominated by the men, and a team including Steve Cockerill & Clive Everest, sailing Roland composites with aluminium masts and Batt sails, were dispatched to the 1986 Worlds in Helsinki.

Althought the Europe Class itself was born In 1987 a Junior Travellers Trophy was introduced to encourage younger members to join the open meeting circuit - what ever did happen to this? Also that year the first combined Mens and Ladies Worlds were held on the same week at the same venue - how times have changed since!

> 1988 was the 25th anniversary of the International Class, and also heralded some major changes. The Class was selected for the Youth Worlds, and became a Youth Class supported by the RYA in the UK. The world's were limited to a total entry of 300, and the first Veterans Cup was held in Czechoslovakia. After some major campaigning by IECU the Class was selected as the Olympic Womens singlehander, for the 1992 Games. The RYA created the first squad of potential Olympians in 1989, and the use of carbon masts became the norm abroad. That year's Worlds in Sweden was the first for someone called Shirley Robertson who finished 57th ! In the UK subscriptions remained at 5 Pounds. The first Youth Europeans were held in West Germany.

> As part of the drive to support the UK Class, the Committee decided to purchase a Searider rib, and money was raised by raffles, a sponsored bike ride, and provision of loan from the Sports Council. This facility proved very well although eventually being sold in 1995.

> The Barcelona Olympics of 1992 saw the first outing for the Europe, and a rapidly improving Robertson finished 9th.

> John Harrisson finally decided to step down after 17 years as the Class Secretary and stal

wart in 1994. Sue Moss took over the reigns. The 1995 Olympics Trials at Weymouth, saw a major incident with the introduction of a "swing test" and the failure of all but one boat to pass. Thoses that failed had lead taped to their bows!

The 96 Atlanta Olympics brought heartache for Shirley by finishing 4th, and the RYA announced its first Olympic Development Squad, coached by Jayne Singleton.

A bid by the UK to host the 1999 Europeans was made in 1997, and that year also saw Sue Moss standing down and Robert Laurie becoming Class Secretary.

In 1998 a full UK Men's team competed at the Worlds for many years, and the introduction of a new rule to halt the development of wing masts came about. At home the "nightmare" SalcombeNationals occurred, but an increase in the membership reverses a slow decline of previous years.

The '99 Europeans held at Hayling Island dominated the UK Class Association. 218 competitors was the largest gathering of Europes in the ever seen. Shirley Robertson tops this with a silver medal.

The first Worlds of the new Millennium were held in January with the boys in Brazil. The UK Class Association puts in a bid for a Lottery Grant to purchase a rib to assist with training. The year is then rounded off with an Olympic Gold for Shirley at the Sydney Games.

What will the next 25 years hold for the Class...



1. SAILING SPECIFIC INJURY PREVENTION SEMINAR

The aim of the seminar is to introduce the subject and expand the knowledge of MNA's, and their associated professionals, in the prevention of sailing specific injuries. Through the sharing of Sue's extensive knowledge of the subject, ISAF hopes to reduce injuries and hence they will be less of a limiting fac-

2. 2004 OLYMPIC GAMES

Olympic Village - Construction on residential areas of the Olympic Village is to begin late in May 2001. The deadline for completion of the project is 30 December 2003, about eight months before the Games. About 70% of the facilities are already in place. Athens Olympic Broadcasting - Following the agreement signed in December 2000 with International Sports Broadcasting (ISB), and

in accordance with the provisions of this, the host broadcasting company of the Athens 2004 Games was founded in Athens, week commencing 9 April, under the formal name of Athens Olympic Broadcasting S.A. (Athinaiki Olympiaki Radiotileoptiki A.E.) and the trademark of AOB. AOB will function as the Olympic Broadcasting Organisation for the 2004 Games, for the production of international broadcasts, the organisation and management of the International Broadcasting Centre (IBC), and the provision of all necessary services to the Games broadcasting rights-holders.

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FROM ALL-RUSSIA

In spite I am not involved in "Europe" class programme in Russia, but as Sport Coordinator of All-Russia Yacht Racing Federation, I send you information about racing of Russian team in this class.

From April 13 till April 19 Sochi's Regatta was conducted.

It was one of the most popular regatta in former USSR. Then several years has been cancelled and again born in new millenium. The weather was warm and medium and light winds permitted to have 7 races in all olympic classes, plus Snipe and Laser-Radial.

In "Europe" class 9 sailors (female) represented 2 countries Russia and Belorussia. Unfortunately best Belorussian sailor Drozdovskaya leaved Sochi for Hyères Regatta in France, but other three Belorussian fighted very well and one of them Anastasya Podobed (who was in the Olympic Games of Savannah 1996) won the regatta with 6 points.

Best Russian Anastasya Maletina second with 14 points. Anastasya is still Junior and two weeks before Sochi had won Junior Spring Russian Championship in Anapa (27.3/3.4).

Third prize was won by Maria Valkovitch, 18 points (Junior) and fourth Regina Zakirova, 18 points.

We hope that Oleg Khopersky, one of the best single-handed sailor of USSR and Russia (multichampion of Europe and priser of World Championships in Finn Class) who started his coaching with Europe Class help our girls soon.

Due to small fleet of Europe dinghy, men do not sail in this class but in September they can start in non-olympic classes nationals (13.20/09), ten days before Russian Open, Olympic Classes. (21.27/09). Sergey Kuzovov.



FROM ITALY

During the past year it hasn't been easy to develop an efficient activity at regional and local level. Therefore this year Asseuropa has decided to increment the principal activity and organise more national regattas. The actual 3 national and qualifying regattas have been incremented to 6 with 36 races of selection.

It's a big effort and challenge for the organisers ans sailors but we feel it is essential for the instruction of the young ones just arrived from Optimist and the sailors in their improvement.

Actually, 4 regattas and 24 races. They have taken place at Marsala (Sicilia), at Napoli, at Torbole (Lago di Garda) and at Monfalcone.

A provisional selection has been made, in mens fleet: Giogio Colombo, Ricardo Piseddu, Alejandro Durante, Michele Benvenuti, Stefano Severgnini, Andrea Tical, Maurizio Scazzolo and in the women's fleet: Larisa Nevierov, Angela Mastalli, Maria Abbate, Giulia Pignolo, Martina Castaldo and Elena Poli.

Most of these sailors will be part of the national team that will participate in the 2001 Worlds and European Championships.

The 5th and the 6th selection regattas will take place respectively at Livorno from the

29/4 to 1/5 and from 12/5 to 13/5 at Arco in the Lago di Garda.

During the month of January we have lost the lawyer Raimondo Ingangi, former delegate for Asseuropa in Napoli and for the region of Campania.

It is a great loss for the direction of the Asseuropa and his friends of the sailing sports.

We remember him in the last regatta as organiser and perfect host during the Youth Championship in Napoli, enthusiast and friendly at Isola de Ischia where he hosted in his house the authorities of this championship.

In the recent national regatta held in Napoli has been asigned the award of a trophy challenge with his name that will be repeated every year and given to the winner of the first national regatta of the programme each year.

This Trophy has been established by the Lega Navale Italiana di Napoli and also the Asseuropa in memory of Raimondo Ingangi, the passionated protagonist of the sailing life of Napoli and the unstopable sports leader

FROM BRAZIL

The 22nd Japanese National Championship was held from March 31 to April 1 at Odo Harbour in Fukuoka. Some Europe sailors may remember Fukuoka as the venue of the Youth World. 14 boats entered (10 girls and 4 boys), and 6 races were sailed under medium wind range.

It was a very exciting event, and top 4 boats were within 3 points. Yoshiaki Nagai returned to the Champion after the last race, and Maiko Sato and Takaaki Kawata were equal in points and only one point behind Nagai. Maiko broke the tie to finish second. Aiko Saito also had a chance to win the title back after four races, but she slowed down towards the end to finish fourth, 2 points behind Maiko and Takaati.

Wakako Tabata who finished fifth joins Maiko and Aiko to go the World Championship in Vilamoura and Takaati will be the only Men's entry to the Worlds. Mahoko Shimohana who finished sixth and Maiko will sail the Asian Championship in Pusan, Korea in September.

After the National Aiko Saito gave two days

clinic to the young Europe sailors together with Mr Mifune and Mr Komatsu, Japanese Olympic Sailing Team staff. It was supposed to be held before the National Championship, but Aiko had the special opportunity to meet the King of Norway just before the regatta, so the clinic was moved to a later date. JSAF (Japanese Sailing Federation) is now keen in training Europe Class for the future Olympic events, and 90% of the sailors here are still high-teens. We are hoping to increase the number of the boats and more clinics in Japan.

Our next big event is in October: the Enoshima Olympic Week. It will be from October 18 to 21, so if someone is interested in coming to Japan, please let us know. Asian Championship will take place from 16 to 25 September in Pusan where the 1988 Olympic Games were held.

Aiko Saito JPN-225 We are going with eight sailors to the Worlds in Portugal this year. Probably four men and four women. We're training hard and from the 27/07 till the 01/08 we will have our National Olympic Week in Santos, on the coast near Sao Paulo.
